Why was it necessary for all of the אבות הקדושים to have spent their entire lives opposite such people? What is the lesson for us to learn from this?

HaRav Moshe Shapiro דצ"ל explained that in order for a person to succeed and become great, he must be confronted with obstacles, falling, then rising time after time, until he reaches the top of the mountain. That mountain is custom built for everyone, every person has his own challenges, his own dilemmas and his own struggles. By working on himself and overcoming those struggles he can become the greatest he can be. Without challenges no one can grow, no one can shine. What makes a person great is climbing the mountain, dropping, getting back up and continuing until he reaches the top. However, that struggle does not end, as throughout our life new obstacles are placed in front of us allowing us the ability to continue the climb of greatness.

As a child, one of the great games we used to play was "king of the mountain"; climbing to reach the top of a snowdrift in a school parking lot, only to fall back or get pulled back by others trying to reach the top. Those who joined with friends, or simply watched how others succeed, eventually reached the top themselves. Yet, if the mountain was too tall, or the snowdrift was too small, there was no game of "king of the mountain", as the challenge was simply not there.

To be successful in life, we are blessed with challenges and struggles, which at times we don't understand. We must all realize that to become king of the mountain, we must climb that mountain, accept the challenges, and eventually become the greatest we can possibly be.


